**Octubre: Mes del Rosario**

El 7 de octubre de 1571 se llevó a cabo la batalla naval de Lepanto en la cual los cristianos vencieron a los turcos quienes fueron musulmanes. Los cristianos sabían que si perdían esta batalla su religión podía peligrar y por esta razón confiaron en la ayuda de Dios, a través de la intercesión de la Santísima Virgen por rezar el rosario. Sabiendo de la victoria por el Espíritu, el Papa San Pío V ordenó el toque de campanas y una procesión. Posteriormente, instituyó la fiesta de Nuestra Señora de las Victorias el 7 de octubre. Un año más tarde, Gregorio XIII cambió el nombre de la fiesta por el de Nuestra Señora del Rosario y determinó que se celebrase el primer domingo de Octubre (día en que se había ganado la batalla). Actualmente se celebra la fiesta del Rosario el 7 de octubre y el mes de octubre es dedicado al rezar el rosario.

## Gospel Meditation

## Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

A life-long Catholic friend of mine recently mumbled to me, "I can't stand all these converts to the faith. They're always rocking the boat." It surprised me because he is dedicated to evangelization, and yet he struggles with openness to new Catholics. It made me realize how easily I close my heart to those whom I perceive to be outsiders who become new members of the Catholic community. Almost unconsciously I reduce the world to the categories of "us" and "them." The result is that meaningful community silently shrinks in my life. Don't we all do that to some degree?

This week Jesus' punchy parable about the two sons blows up that black and white world. One son said he wouldn't get to work, and then did. The other said he would, and then he did not. "Which did the will of his father?" asks the Lord. Like so many of us, in identifying the first as the answer, the religious authorities manifest hidden hypocrisy in refusing to follow Jesus. They — like us — intuit the correct path but simply won't do it. The tax collectors and prostitutes are indeed following Jesus and thereby getting to work in the kingdom of God. Everyone is called to do God's will regardless of the labels we may apply to them.

This week let's reject the convenient but damaging categories of "insiders" and "outsiders." Instead, let's embrace a grateful attitude that Jesus is calling fallen, weak, and broken men and women like you and me. Then we begin to see that the tax collectors and prostitutes aren't *them*. They are *us*. And Jesus wants all of *us* working in his boat, no matter the rocking.

The example Jesus poses in today's Gospel could have been taken directly from family experience. Each of us can recall instances in which family members spoke one thing but then did another. The point of Jesus' story is to show that our actions speak louder than words, even with God.

As you gather as a family, talk about times when a family member said one thing and then did another. Acknowledge that sometimes the action taken displays a true change of heart. Then read today's Gospel, Matthew 21:28-32. Observe that Jesus faulted the religious leaders for not allowing John the Baptist's message of repentance to change their hearts and actions. The word we sometimes use for this change of heart is *conversion*. Jesus wants us to do more than pay lip service to the Gospel; he wants us to be transformed by his word.

Pray together that your family will experience a conversion to God and show evidence of this in both actions and words. Pray together today's second reading, Philippians 2:1-5.

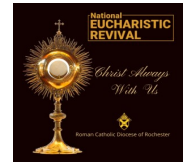

After the Penitential Rite comes Gloria. The Gloria is sung or recited if the Mass is held on Sunday or a holy day of obligation. This ancient hymn recalls the singing angels at Christmas in Bethlehem who sang at Christ's birth, "*Glory to God in the highest, and peace on earth to men of good will...*" (Luke 2:13-14). You may have noticed that we sometimes skip the Gloria. The Gloria is omitted during Mass on the Sundays of Advent, Ash Wednesday, and Sundays of Lent. Why? Simply, the Gloria is a hymn that celebrates the coming of the Lord (using words from the angels at Christ's birth). During Advent and Lent, we return to a time of waiting and solemn preparation. Therefore, we omit the joyful hymn to remind us of the importance of what is coming. Sincerely, Fr. Felician
