
THE ORIGIN OF "THE TWELVE DAYS **OF CHRISTMAS'**

"The Twelve Days of Christmas" was written in England as one of the "*Catechism songs*" to help young children learn the tenets of their faith—a memory aid. At a time when to be caught with anything in "writing" indicating adherence to the Catholic faith could not only get you imprisoned, it could get you hanged. The song gifts are hidden meanings to the teachings of the faith. The "*True Love*" mentioned in the song doesn't refer to an earthly suitor, it refers to God Himself. The "me" who receives the presents refers to eve-ry baptized person. The "partridge in a pear tree" is Jesus Christ, the Son of God. In the song, Christ is symbolically presented as a mother partridge which feigns injury to decoy predators from her helpless nestlings, much in memory of the expression of Christ's sadness over the fate of Jerusalem: "Jerusalem! Jerusalem! How often would I have sheltered thee under my wings as a hen does her chicks, but you would not have it so ... '

- The other symbols mean the following:
- 2 Turtle doves: The Old and New Testaments
- 3 French hens: The Theological Virtues Faith, Hope, and Charity
- 4 Calling birds: The 4 Gospels /The 4 Evangelists
- 5 Golden rings: The first 5 books of the Old Testament the "Pentateuch," which gives the history of man's fall from grace
- 6 Geese a-laying: The 6 days of Creation
- 7 Swans a-swimming: The 7 Gifts of the Holy Spirit or the seven Sacraments
- 8 Maids a-milking: The 8 Beatitudes9 Ladies dancing: The 9 Fruits of the Holy Spirit
- 10 Lords a-leaping: The 10 Commandments
- 11 Pipers piping: The 11 faithful Apostles

12 Drummers drumming: The 12 points of doctrine in the Apostle's Creed Remember, we are now in the twelve days of Christmas.



Step Into the Light

How strange it is to think that if not for Herod's directions, the magi would not have known where to find Jesus. They were not Jews, they knew nothing of the old prophecies. It was Herod who convened the scholars. It was Herod who pointed the way — for ulterior motives, certainly, but nonetheless, this is the part he played. It was Herod who made the Epiphany possible.

"Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance," writes the prophet (Isaiah 60:3). A king may keep to the shadows, suspicious of the light — he may foolishly imagine he can snatch it from the sky to keep as his own possession, and, upon finding the light cannot be governed, grow to loathe it, and even seek to extinguish it once and for all.

But all his grand designs will come to nothing because there is no king so powerful that he can see in the dark. And even a man like Herod — a man so jealous that he sought to kill God cannot prevent the breaking of day.

The Epiphany marks the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. It is a celebration of truth reaching places it was not expected to reach, of brightness illuminating corners of the world long ago consigned to shadow. It is a reminder that the battle has already been won, the night is over. All that remains is for us to decide: will we step into the light?

"See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the LORD shines, and over you appears his glory." — Isaiah 60:2

The tradition of giving gifts at Christmas is thought by some to be rooted in the gift giving of the Magi. In many cultures, gifts are not exchanged at Christmas,


but rather on the feast of the Epiphany. Whenever you exchange your Christmas gifts, take some time to reflect on this tradition of gift giving at Christmas. Think of the best gift you have received. What was it? What made it special? Was it the gift itself, the thought that went into it, or the person who gave it to you?

Read today's Gospel, Matthew 2:2-12. The gifts of the Magi—gold, frankincense, and myrrh—have come to be understood as symbols of Christ's royalty, divinity, and eventual suffering and death. They


are special because in giving them, the Magi acknowledge who Jesus was to be: our Savior. We pray that we will acknowledge Jesus as Savior in all that we do and say.

"I am the bread of life." John 6:51

After the Altar is prepared, the bread and the chalice, filled with wine and a few drops of water, are lifted up, and offered to God in prayer by the priest. Next we come to the washing of the priest's hands. The priest may incense the gifts and then washes his hands with water, assisted by the altar servers, at the side of the altar. The washing is a ceremonial relic of the Jewish tradition present at the time of Jesus. At that time, the high priest washed his hands before making the sacrifice of killing an unblemished, spotless lamb in the Temple of Jerusalem on the day of Passover. So, too, celebrating Mass today, the priest prepares to offer up the Lamb of God (Jesus Christ) to God the Father, so he ceremonially washes his hands to offer a spotless sacrifice. Often times, many connect the priest's hand washing during Mass with the hand washing act by Pontius Pilate (the Roman Governor of Judaea who condemned Jesus to death on the Cross). This is not the case. The Church views that scene as a symbolic gesture wherein Pilate claims that he's washing his hands of the death of an innocent man (Jesus). The hand washing of the priest isn't a connection with Pilate but a ritual purification, such as a connection with the high priest who made a symbolic sacrifice in the Temple of Jerusalem. The Catholic priest re-enacts the real sacrifice of Jesus on the altar. Sincerely, Fr. Felicjan
