



Today's celebration of the Feast of the Holy Family highlights the importance of family in our religious life. We know that Mary and Joseph's faithfulness to God enabled them to cooperate in God's plan for

our salvation by accepting the responsibility to raise God's Son, Jesus. From his parents, Jesus learned how to be a faithful believer in his Jewish tradition. Simeon's prophecy about Mary's sorrow alerts us to the importance of a family's commitment to one another, a commitment that is expressed in both good times and bad.

Gather as a family and recall times when your family showed its commitment to one another in good times and in bad. Recall times when your immediate family was supported by members of your extended family. Note that today we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family, and we see in the family of Jesus an example for our own family life. Read together today's Gospel, Luke 2:22-40. Joseph and Mary expressed their faithfulness to God through their observance of the Law of Moses. Simeon prophesied the grief that Mary would experience at the foot of Jesus' cross. One of the blessings of family life is our commitment to one another, sharing good times and supporting one another through difficult times. Conclude in prayer together thanking God for the grace expressed in your family's commitment to another. Write a prayer together, thanking God for your family life and asking God to strengthen your family's commitment to one another. Pray this prayer together.

"I am the bread of life." John 6:51

Before the gifts of bread and wine are prepared on the altar, the altar servers place the Roman Missal on its stand, angled in the correct position, on the altar, for the priest. The Roman Missal is a large, red, hard bound book, which contains all the prayers, liturgical actions, and order of the Mass. The priest's chalice, often draped with a veil, is set on the altar by the altar server. A large white, square cloth called a corporal is placed on the larger white altar cloth, directly centered in front of the priest. It is on this corporal the elements of bread and wine will be placed for consecration. The deacon (or, if none present, the priest) prepares the gifts on the altar in an action called, suitably enough, "the preparation of the gifts." The deacon or priest pours wine into the chalice (the gold or silver cup that holds the wine that will become Christ's body and blood) and adds a few drops of water to symbolize the union of the divinity and humanity of Christ while silently praying, "by the mystery of this water and wine, may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who hum-bled himself to join in our humanity." The deacon then gives the large host, on a gold or silver flat dish, called a paten, to the priest who lifts the host of bread above the altar and prays silently or audibly, "Blessed are you, Lord, God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made. It will become for us the Bread of Life." The people respond, "Blessed be God forever." Then the priest lifts the wine filled chalice above the altar and says, "Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this wine to offer, fruit of the vine and work of human hands. It will become our spiritual drink." The people again respond, "Blessed be God forever." Sincerely, Fr.
